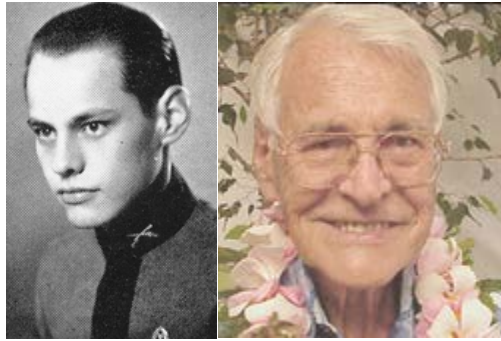

Biographical Note

James Carroll entered the Kamehameha Preparatory School and graduated from the Kamehameha School for Boys in 1936. In 1945, he joined Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA), a pre-paid, non-profit health insurance company. He retired 32 years later in 1977 as vice-president for public relations. He is a member of Hui Panalā'au, a group of men primarily from Kamehameha Schools who colonized the Equatorial Line Islands for the United States of America from 1935 - 1941.

Kuahiwi Alapaki, the "wooded hills of Albert," is the name of 3000 acres of forested hills and valleys between the Kamehameha Schools, Kapalama campus and the summit ridge of the Ko'olau mountains. This area is named in honor of Albert F. Judd, Trustee, who supervised the planting of thousands of trees in Kuahiwi Alapaki between 1924 and 1939 including fruit trees, ironwood, eucalyptus, vinegar trees, silk oak, paperbark and turpentine trees.

Historical Note

THE MAP CONTEST

The contest rules were explained in the Friday, January 19, 1934 Ka Moi:

[Trustee] Albert F. Judd...has made an offer of \$25 cash for the best map...Mr. Padekin Rankin, Mr. W.H. Smith and R. Homer F. Barnes have been chosen by Mr. Judd to judge and award the prize...rules as follows.

1. The map should include the outer boundaries of the two ridges and from the makai end of the forest area up to Station "C" mauka of the second laborer's cabin, to include the trail which at that point goes down into the valley.
