Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama Program Overview

Kamehameha Schools Maui (KSM) is excited to present Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama Summer 2025. Translated as the life source that feeds and nourishes, Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama offers a vibrant, inclusive, student-centered learning community where we strive to inspire, empower, and nurture all learners that they may grow to become dynamic, innovative, and compassionate individuals – E Ola! The kuleana of the hālau is to cast a wide net of diverse learning possibilities that build cultural competence, a strong growth mindset, critical thinking and resilience in our haumāna. Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama emphasizes experiences that develop a student's aloha for their 'āina through interdisciplinary courses that are based in 'ike kūpuna Hawai'i – traditional Hawaiian knowledge through mo'olelo - stories, mele - song, chants and 'ōlelo Hawai'i – Hawaiian language. Unequivocal success in the most basic of education skills (language arts, math, verbal, and science) is an expected outcome when the educational foundation is culturally rich.

Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama 2025 will be an inperson program and is open to students entering grades K-12, including current Kamehameha Schools students, students attending the State of Hawai'i DOE, public charter schools, and other private institutions. Kamehameha Schools believes every student has the right to learn in a safe and accepting learning environment and has a responsibility to facilitate the growth and development of our students in ways that contribute to a strong sense of identity. KS provides appropriate supports for students who wish to express their own gender identity and expression by ensuring equal access to KS school facilities, educational programs, after school or extracurricular activities, and services. Students and families who think they may benefit from this protocol are encouraged to connect with their Dean of Student, School Counselor or Division Administrator.

The Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama program offers select credit advancement courses for high school students seeking to earn required and/or elective credit(s). Early college courses allow high school students the opportunity to earn credits toward both high school graduation and a college degree. Students need to obtain approval for course credits from their home schools to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned. KSM students can request assistant principal approval for credit courses by submitting the Request of Credit Approval form to Māhele Luna office. Application Process

Early registration is recommended as course seats fill quickly. Enrollment is based on the date your child's application is received and upon grade level/course availability. Program notification letters will be sent in early April. Waitlisted students are considered for enrollment through the end of May. Kamehameha Schools reserves the right to cancel any class should enrollment fall below the minimum allowance, or an instructor is unavailable. Please note that kindergarten applicants must be 5 years of age by July 31, 2025.

Policy to Give Preference to Hawaiian Applicants

Kamehameha Schools' policy is to give preference to applicants of Hawaiian ancestry to the extent permitted by law.

If you would like to be considered under that policy, your Hawaiian ancestry must be verified by Kamehameha's Ho'oulu Verification Services. Please contact Ho'oulu Verification Services to complete your Hawaiian ancestry determination as soon as possible, preferably no later than the February 15, 2025 application deadline. Financial Aid

All required financial documentation must be submitted no later than February 15, 2025, the application deadline.

 Please note: INCOMPLETE applications will not be considered for financial aid.

Students who are awarded financial aid and later decide not to attend summer programs must notify the Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama office at 573-7037 immediately to allow waitlisted students the opportunity to enroll.

Medical Clearance

Applicants will be asked to complete a Health Summary and Tuberculosis (TB) Risk Assessment only after you receive an invite to Kula Kauwela in April. The Mo'omō'ali portal provided by Mālama Ola Health Services will only be accessible at that time to those whom recieve invites. Please do not worry about medical clearance at this time.

For those students planning to take one of the following courses:

7th grade, 8th grade, Ka Uluwehi o ke Kai, Lā'au Hawai'i, Lifeguarding, Noi'i Internship, 'Ōlelo Hawai'i 3, Papa Ho'okele Wa'a 1, Papa Ho'okele Wa'a 2, and Surfing will need additional medical clearance due to possible overnight activities, or due to the strenuous physical requirements of the course.

Students with Disabilities

The Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended, prohibits discrimination against individuals with physical or psychological disabilities. Course Changes and Withdrawals

Bus seating capacity is limited, and route pick up and drop off times are approximate. No route changes, alterations, or courtesy stops are allowed. The Transportation Department reserves the right to cancel or change bus route times and locations dependent upon rider enrollment.

Parents are responsible for dropping off students in time for class and picking up students in a timely manner after their last class of the day. Community students drivers will be required to use and display the Summer 2025 Parking Pass issued by Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama office.

KS students with a valid 2024-2025 parking pass may use the same pass during the summer and do not need to reapply.

Attendance Policy Absences

Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama, KSM Summer School has a strict attendance policy. Daily attendance is critical for students to truly benefit from a rigorous and dynamic summer learning experience and master course materials. Absences due to family trips and vacations, games and/or athletic tournaments are discouraged and students who are unable to commit to the full duration of their registered program should not apply.

Students should be in school every day to prepare themselves for the opportunities and challenges presented. Research shows that few factors within students' and families' control are more closely associated with academic success than school attendance. Students need to be present in school to benefit from teacher instruction, and from interaction and exchange of ideas with peers. Excessive absences affect the culture of the classroom, where the goal of faculty is to build a vibrant community of learners.

Lower Division (Grades K-5) and Upper Division (Grades 6-8)

Absences will affect student progress. Excessive absences will also lead to disciplinary action which may include a No Pass for the course.

Upper Division (Grades 9-12)

Course credit is awarded based on mastery of the content. If a student misses more than three days, it may be difficult to keep up with assignments and result in a No Pass/No Credit for the course.

Student Evaluations

Students in grades K through 8 will receive a final student progress report with Pass or No Pass, along with a portfolio, as an evaluation of their work. Students in grades 9 through 12 will receive a final report card with letter grades A-F as an evaluation of their work. A copy of the student's grades for courses can be sent to the school that the student will attend in Fall 2025, as designated.

Lunch and Special Diets

Nutritious lunches prepared in the dining hall and snacks are included in the full-day tuition cost. All full-day students are required to eat school lunches. Students with special dietary needs must bring a physician's note stating dietary restrictions prior to start date of summer program. Requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

These experiences empower our haumāna with the tools necessary to succeed as life-long students and lāhui contributors.

Haumāna will learn about marine ecology and culturally sustainable practices in partnership with several local marine conservation agencies.

Haumāna will be able to actively participate in sea turtle rescue and rehabilitation, coral reef restoration, marine life observations, and pollution prevention projects with expert marine biologists and educators.



KUPU NĀ LEO (Speech)

Course Number: MS05007 8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to 10-12th graders
- 1 elective credit

Our island communities need kānaka maoli leaders who can articulate their concerns and solutions regarding the issues confronting our land and ocean resources. This course focuses on generating change for our 'āina and lāhui by developing the students' public speaking skills grounded in 'ike kupuna. Haumāna will be challenged to create speeches,

prepare debates, and present on current community concerns.

PAPA LĀ'AU HAWAI'I (Hawaiian Ethnobotany)

Course Number: MS05005 8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to 10th 12th grade students.
- 1 elective credit

In collaboration with Pu'u Kukui Watershed and The Nature Conservancy, this course provides an ethnobotanical survey of native Hawaiian flora (herbs and plants), their origin, evolution, and cultural utilization, using Honolua ahupua'a and Haleakalā as living laboratories. These significant spaces offer haumāna a deep knowledge of the important aspects of cultural resource management of our beloved 'āina.

PAPA KIA'I OLA (Lifeguarding)

Course Number: MS04030 8:00am – 12:00pm; Monday-Friday \$300

- Open to 10th -12th grade students.
- Prerequisites: Pretest for swimming skills proficiency. All students must be fifteen years of age at or before the start of the course.
- 0.5 elective credit

The primary purpose of the American Red Cross Lifeguarding course is to provide entry-level lifeguard participants with the knowledge and skills to prevent, recognize and respond to aquatic emergencies and to provide professional-level care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, injuries and sudden illnesses until emergency medical services (EMS) personnel take over. This program offers a choice of Lifeguarding/First Aid/CPR/AED courses to meet the various training needs of a diverse audience.

Requirements:

- Attend the entire course and participate in all class sessions.
- Actively participate in all course activities, including assuming various roles during scenarios.
- Demonstrate competency in all required skills.
- Pass the final skills scenarios.



OLA LOA NO KA LĀHUI

Course Number: MS05009 8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to 9th grade students
- 1 elective credit

When we know better, we do better! Our identity as kanaka maoli is steeped in the mo'olelo and hana of our kupuna, but more importantly, the loina they've left for us. This course explores our na'au as Hawaiians and how we can use this information to connect to our past to be our best 'ōiwi selves for future generations.



PAPA HO'OKELE WA'A I

Course Number: MS04004 8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to $10^{th} 12^{th}$ grade students
- 1 elective credit

Wayfinding is an ancient art and science that our ancestors used to travel across vast oceans. This practice was restored in the 1970's with the help of master navigator Mau Piailug and through the creation of the voyaging wa'a Hōkūle'a. Now after 40 years of sailing, Hōkūle'a and a new generation of way finders have accomplished what some have thought impossible... A sail around the world! If you are inclined to join in this 2,000 yearlong

mo'okū'auhau of voyagers, join us and learn to sail Maui's double-hull voyaging wa'a. Students will be expected to swim frequently. A water skills training session and test will be administered in this course before the students go on the ocean.

There will be 2 scheduled coastal sails that may occur outside of normal class time, in which the students are expected to attend and provide their own transportation in order to earn credit for the course. PAPA HO'OKELE WA'A II

Course Number: MS05004 8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to 11th 12th grade students
 Pre-requisite: Papa Ho'okele Wa'a I
- 1 elective credit

This course expands on the knowledge learned in Papa Ho'okele Wa'a I.

Course Number: MS04020

- Open to all high school students
- Swimming experience is mandatory.
- 0.5 elective credit

Pi'i mai ka nalu! E he'enalu kākou! Surfing has become a world-renowned sport, but it was the sport of our ali'i before it became a sport for world champions with sponsorships. Learn the history, art and science of surfing, while improving your physical health. Whether you like sponging (bodyboarding), shortboarding or longboarding, grab your board and let's chase the waves. Students must successfully complete a swim test before participating in water-based activities.

Po'olua- Early College Program

The Early College Program offers a curriculum of intensive study for highly motivated and academically qualified sophomores, juniors and seniors. These partnerships between Kamehameha Schools Maui and Arizona State University as well as the University of Hawai'i-Maui College (UHMC) allows eligible high school students to attend college classes on the KSM campus or online. Early college courses provides the opportunity for high school students to earn credits toward high school graduation and a college degree. Students need to obtain approval for course credits from their home schools to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned.

Arizona State University Universal Learner 9 Week Program May 27-July 18, 2025

Students will earn college credit from Arizona State University while potentially earning high school credit as well. ASU Universal Learner courses are designed to be online asynchronous, or hybrid courses. This is potentially one of the core requirements needed in a degree seeking pathway from ASU.

CLS 105 COMPUTER APPLICATIONS & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Course Number: MS05046 ONLINE; Monday-Friday

\$600

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn 1 elective credit

This course is an introductory course with a dual focus: one focus on organizations and another focus on the individuals who work for them. At the individual level, we will examine how business decision making can be improved when supporting technologies like spreadsheets are leveraged. From the organizational perspective, we will cover strategic analysis frameworks and business strategies that can be fine-tuned for competition in an increasingly digitally transformed world. Humans are inherently limited in how they might approach problem solving because of the cognitive biases we all bring to decision situations. Understanding these biases and how to confront them using the spreadsheet modeling knowledge gained in this class will change the way you face and solve problems. We will cover practical decisions you will deal with in many different personal and professional business settings. You will build models in spreadsheet software that serve to help you analyze problem situations in a completely new light.

University of Hawai'i- Maui College 5 Week Program
June 16- July 18, 2025

Students cannot enroll in KSM early college courses unless UHMC's Early College Admissions process is

completed and all necessary documentation for early admission is submitted to UHMC.

UHMC instructions and forms pertinent to the Early College Admissions process will be available at www.ksbe.edu/maui/summer and must be completed before being considered for any early college courses.

To qualify for the UHMC program, students must complete the Early College Admissions process which includes:

- UHMC Online Admissions Application
- Consent to Release Grades for Early Admit Student to High School form
- Early Admissions Program Application
- Completion of the Accuplacer placement test(s) with qualifying results eligible for prerequisites of specific courses

Scores for the UH Maui Accuplacer test(s) are valid for one year from the date the test is completed. Students should contact UHMC directly to decide to take the Accuplacer test(s). UHMC charges a fee when a student takes the Accuplacer test.

Once you have completed the UHMC Early College Admissions process, your application will be reviewed. Upon approval, KSM will work with UHMC to ensure students receive his/her acceptance notification.

Students will be responsible for creating a UHMC username and completing UHMC's online registration for their UHMC selected course.

Early college courses are taught by UHMC professors. Coursework is rigorous, and students are expected to meet all college course expectations and requirements. It is important to note that once enrolled in an early college course, a student may not withdraw or drop an early college credit course. Grades earned through these courses will be reflected on the student's college transcript. Early college courses offered this summer include Composition I (ENG 100), Introduction to Psychology (PSY 100) and Hawaiian Studies (HWST107). These all qualify for dual credit for KSM students. This means that the course will count as a college and high school credit. All other students must check with their home schools if dual credit will be applicable. These courses will be taught through synchronous or asynchronous methods, which may include "inperson" time at the discretion of the professor, and

HAWAI'I: CENTER OF THE PACIFIC (HWST 107)

Course Number: MS04040 8:00am-12:00pm; Monday-Friday \$600

- Open to 11-12 grade student
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn 1 elective credit

An introduction to a Native perspective on specific themes such as origins, language, spirituality, environs, the arts, history, and contemporary issues pertaining to Hawai'i and Oceania at large. During the course you will study various sources of information including academic research, contemporary literature, film, and political and legal documents. The purpose of this course is to enable your recognition of Native voices and to aid your development in understanding Native worldviews.

HALE HO'OMĀLAMALAMA: COLLEGE & CAREER SUMMER BRIDGE 2025 KS MAUI STUDENTS ONLY Rising Seniors (Class of 2026) only May 27-June 3, 2025

This is a 2-week course between May 27, 2025 - June 3, 2025. The week and half program targets rising seniors, Class of 2026. Within this program haumana will engage in refining their college personal statements and craft strong supplemental essays. The workshops will guide students through the drafting and revision process, help them identify and express their core values, and ensure their personal statements to stand out to college admissions committees. In addition, students will have the opportunity to take a deeper dive in their Common Application, have a 4-day SAT Prep in preparation to take the SAT exam on June 7th; and take a 2-day Nā Huaka'i Kula Nui, college tour to O'ahu and Hilo. Haumāna who register need to be committed to attending the entire week and half program. An additional application process will be sent out from the College & Career Department. Only 28-32 seats are available. Most expenses will be covered by the College & Career Department.
